



Notes on Contributors

NICOLAE V. DURĂ, Professor, JD, born in 1945 in Romania. He obtained his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in theology from the Theological Institute of University Rank in Bucharest; followed by PhD in Canon Law (1981) in the same University after completing his PhD studies and research in the field of Canon Law in Ethiopia; doctoral and postdoctoral studies and research in France (Catholic Institute and Sorbonne University of Paris) and in Greece (Aristotelian University of Thessaloniki). In 1997 he obtained a degree of Doctor in Canon Law at the Pontifical University of Toulouse (France); and in 2002 — Doctor Honoris Causa granted by the Humanist Sciences University of Ostrog (Ukraine); 2010 — Doctor Honoris Causa — the St. Kliment Ohridski University of Sofia (Bulgaria); 2015 — Doctor Honoris Causa — the Ivane Javakhishvili State University from Tbilisi (Georgia). Professor Emeritus of the Ovidius University of Constanța (2012—). He is a member of the following scholarly organisations: Academy of Romanian Scientists, Society of the Law of the Oriental Churches, based in Vienna; the International Consortium for Law and Religion Studies, Faculty of Law, University of Milan. Professor of Theological Institute of University Rank in Bucharest (1976—2001) and Professor of the Faculty of Law and Faculty of Theology of the Ovidius University in Constanta (2001—). Vice Dean (for Education and Research) of the Faculty of Law, Ovidius University of Constanța (2004—2008); Vice Rector of the Ovidius University for Inter-University Relations and Foreign Students (2008—2012). Prizes: The National Order of Merit (version of the Legion of Honour, Cultural Merit), awarded in 2001 by the President of France, Jacques Chirac, at the proposal of the Minister of External Affairs for his contribution to the promotion of the French language and European culture due to his book, amounting to more than 1,000 pages,

Le Regime de la synodalite selon la legislation canonique, conciliaire, oecumenique, du Ier millenaire, published in Bucharest in 1999; A. D. Xenopol Award granted by Romanian Academy in 2001 etc. Author of books, studies and articles (on theology, canon law, law, history, ecclesiology, the history of ancient literature, philosophy etc.), amounting to thousands of pages published in different languages.

JÍŘÍ DVOŘÁČEK, Dr. theol. habil., Dr. iur. can. orient., graduated in law and Catholic theology from the Palacký University in Olomouc (Czech Republic) and obtained doctorate in Eastern canon law from the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome (PIO). He received his habilitation at the Faculty of Theology, Catholic University of Eichstätt-Ingolstadt, where he is a private Associate Professor (Privatdozent). He teaches Eastern canon law at the Saints Cyril and Methodius Faculty of Theology of Palacký University in Olomouc, and introduction to canon law at the Faculty of Law of Masaryk University in Brno (Czech Republic). He is judge of the Metropolitan Ecclesiastical Court in Prague.

TOMASZ GAŁKOWSKI CP, Professor UKSW, born in 1967, he graduated from the Pontifical Faculty of Theology “Bobolanum”: SJ in Warsaw. In the years 1991—1995 he studied canon law at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, where on the basis of the dissertation “Il quid ius nella realta umana e nella Chiesa” he received his doctoral degree. He was awarded with the Bellarmine’s Prize for his publication (Analecta Gregoriana 269, Roma 1996). In 2007, he received a postdoctoral degree at the Faculty of Canon Law of the University of Card. St. Wyszyński in Warsaw. His monograph *Right–Duty. Priority and interdependence in the law orders: Canonical and the secular society* was awarded with the Prize of the Rector of the University. He is an author of about 70 scholarly publications. His research interests include issues related to the *ratio legis* of the canonical norms and issues of common law and canon law. Currently he is a professor and director of the chair of the Theory of Canon Law at this University.

CĂTĂLINA MITITELU, born in 1974 in Constanța (Romania), is Associate Professor at the Faculty of Orthodox Theology of Ovidius University of Constanța (Romania). She graduated and obtained Bachelor’s and Master’s degrees from the Faculty of History, Faculty of Law, and the Faculty of Theology. Since 2012 she holds a PhD in Theology, specialization Canon Law, at the Ovidius University of Constanța (Romania). Currently, she is a PhD candidate in Law, specialisation Constitutional Law. She published many studies and books on canonical law and

nomocanonical law, matrimonial law, constitutional law, history of law, criminal law, etc.

ANDRZEJ PASTWA, Dr. iur. can. habil., Head of Department of Canon Law and Ecumenical Theology at the Faculty of Theology at the University of Silesia, and a judge at the Metropolitan Ecclesiastical Court in Katowice. He is a member of Consociatio Internationalis Studio Iuris Canonici Promovendo, Consociatio Iuris Canonici Polonorum, as well as Commission for Polish-Czech and Polish-Slovak Relations of the Polish Academy of Sciences. He has published numerous papers on canon law, especially marriage law, most recently: *Il bene dei coniugi. L'identificazione dell'elemento ad validitatem nella giurisprudenza della Rota Romana*, [Biblioteca Teologica, Sezione Canonistica, 7], Eupress FTL—Edizioni Cantagalli, Lugano—Siena 2018. He is the editor-in-chief of the English-language academic journals: *Ecumeny and Law* and *Philosophy and Canon Law*.

STANISLAV PŘIBYL, Associate Professor JUDr., Ph.D., Th.D., J.C.D., is a priest from the Catholic Archdiocese of Prague. He studied at the School of Law of Charles University in Prague and the School of Canon Law of the Institutum Utriusque Iuris of the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome. He received the degree of Associate Professor following a successful defence of his dissertation, *Tschechisches Staatskirchenrecht nach 1989* (Czech Religion Law after 1989), from the School of Law of University in Trnava (Slovakia). He is a judge soudcem and a promoter of justice of the Metropolitan Tribunal in Prague, teaches church law and secular law at the School of Theology of the University of South Bohemia in České Budějovice, and is a scientific co-worker at the Institute for Legal Aspects of Religious Freedom of the University in Trnava, as well as serves as a spiritual administrator at the St. Mary of the Assumption and Charlemagne Church in Prague-Karlovy Vary.

WILHELM REES, Dr. theol. habil, born in 1955 in Augsburg, studied Catholic Theology in Augsburg. He worked as Visiting Professor of Canon Law at the School of Catholic Theology of the University of Bamberg from 1992 to 1996. Since 1996 he is a Full Professor of Canon Law at the Theological School of the Leopold-Franzens-University, Innsbruck. He has published numerous papers on Canon Law, ecclesiastical law, and civil law concerning religion. He is the co-editor of the new edition of the *German Handbook of Catholic Canon Law (Handbuch des katholischen Kirchenrechts)* (2015) and the co-editor of the German scientific book series *Canonistic Studies and Texts (Kanunistische Studien und Texte)*, published by Duncker & Humblot, Berlin).
