Daniel C. Wagner, Ph.D., is Associate Professor of Philosophy at Aquinas College (MI, USA), Faculty Associate at the St. Pope John Paul II Institute, at University of St. Thomas (TX, USA), President of the Society for Thomistic Natural Philosophy, founding member and Editor of Reality: A Journal for Philosophical Discourse, and founding member of The Society for 21st Century Thomism. He studied at the School of Law of Charles University in Prague and the School of Canon Law of the Institutum Utriusque Iuris of the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome. He received the degree of associate professor following a successful defence of his dissertation, *Tschechisches Staatskirchenrecht nach 1989* (*Czech Religion Law after 1989*), from the School of Law of University in Trnava (Slovakia).
